Is it typical for a town of 1,000 people to embark upon a ten-year-long project of sewing a 90-meter-long tapestry, ask one woman to draw all the images, dye thousands of meters of pure Icelandic wool by hand with local plants, invite the world to help create it by asking them to come and sew, and complete the whole tapestry 2 ½ years earlier than planned? In so many ways this project speaks to the tenacity of Icelanders and their nature to always dream big, dare to try, and get the job done!
