Western Icelanders: Our Story Our Legacy

Minneota in Minnesota was first settled by Icelanders in 1875. Kathryn Rothman will share the story of these first settlers, many of whom came from the rocky, lava plains of northeast Iceland to this flat prairieland with little but their personal belongings and books. They built schools, churches, libraries, farms and industries. An enduring love of learning and their Icelandic heritage are part of their legacy. Author Bill Holm was born here, and his books and poetry capture the spirit of Minneota. Kathryn has spent time researching the local history of area, and interviewing descendants of those first settlers. Join us online to hear more about the Icelanders who came to Minneota

further west in 1888 to settle in the Red Deer county of Alberta. **Mark Petursson**, will share the story of these first settlers to Alberta, who came in search of a better life for their children. In the settlement of Tindastoll, later named Markerville, the Icelandic pioneers relied on fishing to sustain them through the winters and rich pastures for sheep and cattle. In the early 20th C, Icelanders began to move to the urban centres of Calgary and Edmonton. Still, the bond with their Icelandic heritage remained strong and Markerville, Calgary and Edmonton remain bastions of Icelandic heritage. Join us to hear the saga of Icelandic-Albertans.

We are very excited to see the caliber of artists taking part, and to see the program begin to 'take off'. For the coming year, we have plans for how the artist residents will share their work with INLNA chapters and members through in creative ways online or otherwise.

The Buttermaker's House Markerville, Alberta



Stephan G. Stephansson was one of the great poets of modern Iceland despite living most of his life in North America. He emigrated to Wisconsin at 19, and to Markerville, Alberta at 35, not returning to Iceland until he was in his 60s. He was a self-educated poet who often wrote after a day's work as a farmer, or at night, when persistent insomnia kept him from sleeping. Like many Icelanders, he remained deeply connected with his roots despite living his life in a new place. He wrote his poetry in Icelandic, often on themes of nature, clearly inspired by the harsh and beautiful surroundings of his adopted homeland. Today, his story is kept alive in Canada in the Stephan G. Stephansson House Museum, which is part of Historic Markerville. More than buildings, Historic Markerville supports history and culture through year-round educational and artistic activities. This is very much in line with the values of the Icelandic settlers of the region, who built a local lending library and supported musicians and authors. The Icelandic National League of North America is proud to continue this tradition.

There is more information on the artists awarded the Artist in Residency and the work they have done with the support of the Icelandic National League of North America, to be found in the INLNA AGM report and online on the INLNA website.

The Buttermaker's House is situated in Historic Markerville. Here you will discover a constellation of restored historic properties including a church, a community hall, a one room schoolhouse, an original creamery and the restored residence of the great poet Stephan G. Stephansson. Historic Markerville gives you a living history. Their latest project to restore the heritage 1913 Buttermaker's House, with the intention to make it into an artist residency where creative souls could come to be inspired by the river and meadows that enthused Stephansson. The Buttermaker's House has been meticulously renovated with new furniture and appliances which maintain a classic aesthetic while providing modern comfort. The house has a bedroom, living room, full kitchen, bathroom, and a small studio for working. The house sits on a tree-lined lot along the slowly flowing Medicine River in the vibrant and dynamic rural community of Markerville. It's an excellent place to rest, reflect, connect and create.
